The goal of this course is to cover the most representative aspects related to the language and culture of the Indo-Europeans (IE). In particular, the course will focus on the emergence of the term IE, the debate about the cradle of the IE tribes and the characteristics of the various IE languages. In addition, the attempts to restore the Protoindoeuropean will be covered and the basic traits of the IE language at all linguistic levels will be explored. Finally, the IE civilization and the formation of the Greek language will be studied.
