(3) SYLLABUS

The course focuses on ancient Greek speech as the pre-eminent political organ of the organized community, that is, of the city. The way in which the speech served political purposes is examined in the analysis of various types of the ancient Greek Secretariat. Philosophy, historiography, but even theater and oral use and exploitation of traditional myths, are examined in relation to their political tone. In other words, their relationship with the political environment in which they were created and called to serve is being investigated. Issues such as intention and expediencies in historiography (were Herodotus and Thucydides objective historians?), The purely political side of the Tragedy (is there a political reason why Medea kills her children?), The use of mythological motifs for cultivating a political propaganda (such as the conscious mobilization of mythology by the tyrant Peisistratus to secure his political acceptance).

Comparing ancient uses of speech as a political tool with examples borrowed from our modern political and social developments often reveals a recurring way of thinking - which is not at all strange, since the relationship between speech and society remains primarily political.
