#### (3) SYLLABUS

In the course "EU Institutions and Policies", the students of the 5th Semester, having already been taught in the 2nd Semester, the introductory course in European Integration, will approach the basic institutions, the political bodies and the EU policy-making processes.

The dynamics of the European integration process is the main framework of study. A useful guide in this direction is the interpretive presentation of the theory of European integration.

As a result of a process of voluntary economic and political integration between the nationstates of Europe, the EU started with 6 states and has now grown to 28. It was originally a coal and steel community and evolved into an economic and monetary union with a view to political union. This course does not cover the history of European integration, but rather aims to understand how the EU works.
