(3) SYLLABUS

Given the extent of the bilingualism / multilingualism phenomenon, both at the state and at the individual level, face-to-face interactions are frequent among groups of speakers, of which at least some speak more than one language. The course examines the various social and political consequences of language contact, but focuses on the purely linguistic consequences of the phenomenon.

Three main types of contact-induced language change are discussed:

- (a) Borrowing / interference phenomena
- (b) Extreme linguistic mix (pidgins, creoles, bilingual mixed languages)
- (c) Language death
