(3) SYLLABUS

This course is an introduction to the modern and contemporary history of the peoples in the Mediterranean. First it focuses on the geographical presentation/description of the region and the evolution and interrelationship of the civilizations. Then it examines in detail three subregions, southern Europe, the Middle East, and North Africa. A major part of the course focuses on the Arab and Ottoman civilizations, and on the causes and consequences of Great Power intervention in the region. Special emphasis is given on the interwar politics in the European South, on the modern history of the Mediterranean Arab States and on the basic characteristics of major issues of regional conflict such as the Palestinian and the Cyprus ones.
