# (3) SYLLABUS

In the fourth semester the present perfect and its use are taught, as well as exclamations, indirect questions, the past perfect, the sequence of tenses, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> conditional. These structures are taught and consolidated in context, in texts and vocabulary related with wildlife, personal achievements, superstitions, family matters, global problems. The students are taught how to write a short autobiography, an article on personal achievements, an email where they offer advice etc.
