The aim of the course is to examine global and regional multilateral texts on the protection of human rights. The course also examines issues of ethics, morals and customs, the relationship between the state and the population, the relationship between the members of a society, the type of government, etc. This discussion also covers the Arab and Islamic

countries that are of particular interest to a Department of Mediterranean Studies. Through the posting in the e-class of these texts in the Greek language (where they exist) and mainly in the English language, the students can easily follow their analysis but also to proceed to the examination and the comparison between them. This will familiarize students with reading and understanding foreign language legal and regulatory texts and could be done in addition to the academic English course.

At the end of the course students are able to have a global view of the subject in two axes: first, what are the protected rights and protected fundamental freedoms and, second, what are the institutional mechanisms for monitoring the compliance of states to these texts (regional human rights courts, UN oversight mechanisms, etc.).

Students are given the opportunity either individually or in small groups to prepare assignments and even texts that are not covered during the lectures and to present them thus improving their skills in research and writing scientific texts. Finally, the knowledge that students will acquire can be used in other courses of the Department of Mediterranean Studies and lay the foundations for postgraduate studies.
