#### (3) SYLLABUS

This course examines the history of the Hellenistic era, as well as a representative part of its historiography, as it is presented in works by Polybius the Great and Diodorus of Sicily. The issues under discussion concern the Macedonian monarchy and its relations with other Greek cities, the cultural achievements of the Hellenistic era and a number of state entities that continued their historical course or emerged after the death of Alexander the Great, such as the kingdom. of Macedonia, the kingdom of Pergamon, the state of the Seleucids, the state of Ptolemy, as well as other less powerful or ephemeral kingdoms, such as Thrace, Palmyra, and the Bosphorus. The position of the Aetolian and Achaean Confederation and the state of Rhodes is also examined, while a text from the original works of Polybius and Diodorus is approached.
