(3) SYLLABUS

The Practical Training (PT) takes place during the summer months (July - August), from the third year of study so the students of the Department of Mediterranean Studies have chosen their field of study (Division), and is linked to the practical application of knowledge and skills acquired during their semesters of study. The PT's duration is one month. Each participating student receives a monthly allowance and has accident insurance coverage. Each student is supervised by a faculty member of the Division of International Relations & Organizations and a professional from the practicum placement. The two supervisors cooperate in setting up the work project of the PT and provide the student with all the necessary information.

The professional from the practicum placement supervises the student during the practical training and provides a performance evaluation. This evaluation concerns mainly the type and duration of employment of the student and is sent to the supervising faculty member. Students submit an End-Report on the type of activities of the practicum placement, the general topic of their PT and its connection with their studies, the results of the PS as well as their suggestions for improving the program.

The faculty member assigns the final grade based on both the assessment of the placement supervisor and the student's report.
